### **Township Begins Process of Revising Comprehensive Plan**

Haverford Township has begun the process of updating our Comprehensive Plan, which was adopted in 1988 and last updated in 2009. The Comprehensive Plan is the Township's primary planning document that

- (1) guides planning and development policy,
- (2) sets a vision for the community,
- (3) describes goals and objectives for existing and future development, and
- (4) provides an implementation strategy for achieving the goals.

The Board of Commissioners has appointed a Steering Committee comprised of Commissioners, residents and staff to guide the development of the Plan. The Committee has issued a Request for Proposals for a professional consultant to assist in developing an action-oriented and implementable Plan. The Board of Commissioners anticipates approving a recommendation early this spring.

The Steering Committee and the Board of Commissioners recognize that input from a broad range of citizens, businesses and other community stakeholders is essential to developing and implementing a Plan that fully reflects the ideas and desires of the community. To achieve this goal, the Steering Committee will conduct research and distribute surveys to Township residents and businesses, and undertake an extensive review of existing conditions using a comprehensive community engagement strategy designed to maximize community input.

The Committee will prepare a profile of the Township with the goal of answering critical questions such as "Where are we now," "Where do we want to be," and "How do we plan to reach our

goals?" In addition to consulting the public, interested parties, and government agencies, the Steering Committee plans to hold public meetings to receive maximum input.

The revised Comprehensive Plan will be the foundation for new zoning and subdivision regulations, and other Plan implementation tools intended to improve the public health, safety, and welfare of our community. We hope you will participate in creating a vision for the future of Haverford Township.



### 2018 Code Enforcement Report

The Codes Enforcement Office has implemented a new system to convert all paper documents to electronic files and is rolling out a paperless permit system in 2019. Director Joe Celia will provide online permit applications for rental, housing and trade licenses, as well as certain building and highway occupancy permits by this summer. He and the Codes staff will be working to add all permit paperwork via the online system, including the ability to upload PDF files of drawings, photos with the online permit applications and communicate permit status and inspection via email. We will be adding credit card payments and will be exploring other electronic payment options.

### SEWER BACKUP AND FLOODING INSURANCE



# AN IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT FROM HAVERFORD TOWNSHIP



Sewer backups and flooding can cause devastating property damage and are not covered by standard homeowners' insurance policies.

The majority of these claims are the responsibility of the property owner.

Sewage from sanitary sewer lines occasionally back up into houses through drain pipes. These backups not only cause extensive water damage that is difficult and expensive to repair, but also create health hazards.

Haverford Township is not responsible for damages caused by sewers,
drains and sump pumps except under limited/special circumstances
provided by the PA Municipal Immunity laws.

Township residents must be aware that they should review their homeowner's, flood and sewer backup insurance coverage with their agent/insurance company in order to properly protect their personal residences—probably the most valuable tangible asset that we all have.

Article I, Section 149-3, subsection C (2), Sewer Service Regulations of the Township Code states that all sewer service laterals from the Township's sewer, regardless of location, are the property of the customer and/or owner and shall be maintained by him in good condition and repair.

Please pay particular attention to the following coverages:

### **Coverage for Sewers, Drains and Sump Pumps:**

This valuable coverage is <u>not</u> included under your standard homeowner's policy but can be purchased by endorsement for an additional premium.

### **Flood Coverage:**

Flood coverage is <u>not</u> included under your homeowner's policy. However, flood insurance is available under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and can be obtained through your insurance agent or broker.

The Township does not provide flood insurance.





In October 2018, the Board of
Commissioners unanimously approved
resolution 2104-2018, providing a timeline to
transition to clean sources of energy to
address the Climate crisis. Since then,
Haverford Township and the Environmental
Advisory Committee (EAC) have worked
together to obtain \$19,000 in PA DEP and
PECO grants to install public and Township
fleet electric vehicle charging stations in the
parking lot next the Skatium. They are now
working out project details on power

to achieve the long term goals since they produce the vast majority of carbon emissions. The two biggest sources of greenhouse gases are from electricity production and transportation. 



### **Composting**

**Consider Composting!** 

Want to cut trash volume? EAC will provide information on how to compost so you can decrease trash, and save all of <u>us</u> money while improving our environment *and* your garden!

Composting from a Converted Non Believer, by Victor Barsky

We have lived in Haverford township for the last 30 years, and have been faithfully disposing single stream recycling items along with lawn and garden waste products curbside. About 3 years ago, my wife, a Master Gardener, suggested that we compost our organic scraps. I was not convinced. I thought that it would create smells, draw insect, rodents, etc. It does not!

What finally pushed me to agree to this was going to the Philadelphia Flower Show. I learned more about composting, and my wife saying that she was probably the last Master Gardener not to do this. We purchased a dual bin composter which could be manually turned. Having 2 bins allows us to have a "cooking side" and a "loading side". There are many types, sizes and prices available. Having fun putting it together was just the start of my enjoyment, yes really!

I was amazed how much less we put out curb side on a weekly basis of compostable items, saving the Township on trash fees and saving us all tax dollars. When we cut up a melon, for instance, so much was going in the trash was now going into our new "gadget." We also put in coffee grounds and tea leaves which adds to the brew, and mix about 75% shredded leaves from our lawn mower that we piled up from last fall in a corner behind our shed in our case. You can most always find some out of the way place.

Leaves are high in minerals for the garden. Depending on our organic waste amounts, temperature, aeration, and moisture, within a very short time, the loaded side decomposes into rich compost for our garden beds. The finished compost has zero costs, saving about \$5 a bag if you buy it at lawn and garden stores.

Composting can be accomplished using many other methods, but the end result saves the home owner money, the township, and is good for our plants and our planet. Think about it, you will not be sorry you did!

# **Stormwater Planters for Haverford Businesses**

Haverford businesses can request a free storm water flow through planter if they have downspouts in a visible, paved location on their business property. A limited number will be available to good locations under a pilot program funded by the Haverford Township Civic Council. ### What Are They?

Rain Gardens are beautiful landscaped areas built down, instead of up, intercepting runoff from buildings, driveways and other impervious surfaces before it can reach the storm sewers and streams. Small gardens are typically 6-12 inches deep and drain within a day or two after a rain. Plants are water and drought tolerant and need little or no watering after they are established. 






### How to Dispose of Nearly Anything

### **Radioactive Waste**

Sanitation trucks are scanned for radioactive waste upon arriving at a disposal facility. If any adiation is detected to be present within the trash load, the truck is detained and isolated by the facility. Administrative personnel, PA DEP, and the Bureau of Radiation Protection are notified and a certified health physicist is engaged to isolate and determine the type and degree of radioactive material.

Trucks that test positive for radiation are unable to resume trash collection for the day and are issued a fine by the disposal facility.

The most frequent instances of alarms are from residentially generated medical wastes such as radioactive iodine from stress tests, chemotherapeutic treatments for cancer, and waste from people or pets receiving nuclear medical or radiation oncology treatments.

Radioactive or potentially contaminated items should **never** be discarded with regular trash.

For information on the proper disposal of medical waste, please consult your physician. If you require the collection of contaminated items, please contact the Department of Public Works at (610) 446-1000 ext. 2263

### **Disposing of Needles**

If you use needles, please dispose of them in a safe manner.

### DO NOT THROW NEEDLES IN THE TRASH WITHOUT BEING IN A CONTAINER!

Needles can be disposed of in a juice or milk plastic lined container, £a coffee can, a plastic laundry detergent bottle or a container from a medical professional where the needles are contained. There have been too many issues with our employees being stuck by random needles in the trash. As a matter of public health, do not throw loose needles in the trash.

We will be happy to arrange a pickup for latex paint cans. Please call (610) 446-1000 ext. 2263.

### **Brush Pick-up**

Brush, consisting of small tree/hedge trimmings, weeds, branches less than 3 feet long and 1½ inches in diameter is picked up separately from your regular trash pickup. Brush pickup helps reduce the amount of trash going to the Marple Transfer Station and it greatly reduces the disposal fees we pay to keep sanitation fees to you down.

Brush is picked up on Monday, and must be out for collection by 6:30 a.m.Please follow the following rules when placing brush for collection:

- Branches must be tied together with rope or twine, DO NOT USE WIRE.
- Brush is to be put out in cans or brown biodegradable bags, NO PLASTIC BAGS.
- NO GRASS OR LEAVES may be added to brush collection; they will be picked up in your regular trash. Of course, leaves will be collected separately during the fall season.

### **Single Stream Recycling**

We encourage all residents to recycle and single stream recycling makes it easier than ever! 32-gallon recycling bins are available for purchase at the Township Building for \$20.00. Alternatively, free recycling decal stickers are available in the Department of Public Works or the main receptionist desk for residents who have purchased their own unlabeled bins. New residents who have purchased a home within the six months may pick up a bin at no cost. Please call the Public Works Department at (610) 446-1000 ext. 2264 or 2263 for further details.

# Township Awarded \$16,000 Certified Local Government Grant for Updating the Historic Resource Survey


In March 2015, Haverford Township became the 45<sup>th</sup> Certified Local Government (CLG) in Pennsylvania. The CLG program, jointly administered by the National Park Service and the State Historic Preservation Office, benefits the township by providing access to technical assistance to help us in our efforts to preserve the historic resources and cultural heritage of our community. Another advantage of CLG status is an opportunity to compete for financial assistance through a competitive grant application process to improve implementation of the township's historic preservation ordinance. Being a CLG demonstrates the Township's commitment to celebrating the history of our community by preserving buildings and sites that represent that history.

We're excited to announce that the Haverford Township Historical Commission, working with Commissioner Kevin McCloskey and township staff, has received a CLG grant for the 2019-2020 grant cycle. This \$16,000 grant to the Township will be used to assist the Commission in meeting its obligation under Township Ordinance No. 2580-2009, to "Maintain and update the Historic Resource Survey and Inventory of Historic Resources." A professional historic preservation consultant will be retained to update photographs of existing buildings and sites on the township's Historic Resources Survey (not updated since 1993!), and to identify resources that could be added to the survey to promote preservation of the township's historic character.

Work on this project is expected to begin in September 2019 and be completed in mid-2020. Look for future updates here, and at the Haverford Township Historical Commission booth at the Heritage Festival this June.

# **Ardmore Avenue Bridge Replacement Project**

On April 10, the Township hosted an informational session for PennDot to make themselves available to our residents regarding the Ardmore Avenue bridge replacement project. The presentation and Q&A session that followed brought up several concerns shared by both residents and Township officials on traffic patterns and detours. 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> Ward Commissioners Kevin McCloskey, Dan Siegel, Andy Lewis and Larry Holmes, who were in attendance plus any residents who wished to speak were given the opportunity to ask questions directly to PennDot representatives. This project will replace the bridges spanning both Cobbs Creek and the SEPTA Norristown High-Speed Route

100 line. Additionally, the project will include a complete reconstruction of the roadway between Golf House and Haverford Roads to accommodate two shoulders and two travel lanes. Sight distance will also be improved for motorists traveling over the bridge over SEPTA, allowing better visibility of oncoming traffic. Tree removal and aerial utility relocation efforts began March 25. Once Ardmore Avenue is closed between Darby and Haverford Roads, contractors will have 338 days to open the new bridge and remove detours. Significant monetary damages will be assessed against the contractor for each day the detour remains in place after the 338<sup>th</sup> day. The PennDot plan calls for motorists to be detoured over Haverford Road, College Ave and Darby Road. A temporary pedestrian bridge will be installed at the Ardmore Avenue Station for access to the platforms of the Hi-Speed Line and parking at the Ardmore Avenue Station will be accessed thru Golf View Road.

The Police Department will increase enforcement in the area and traffic violations will be strictly enforced. The police want to remind drivers

that they should obey all traffic laws, be courteous and to expect delays. They will also be monitoring traffic and will work diligently to improve on any major delays and choke points.

The project is expected to be completed in the Spring 2020.





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# **Development Projects**



The following projects have been proposed, approved, or are under construction in Haverford Township.

The Haverford Township School District has begun to construct a new Lynnewood Elementary School on the same property as the existing school with new athletic fields, parking area, and playground. The old school will be razed at the completion of construction.

Pets First Veterinary Center, located at 924

Haverford Road, has been approved to demolish the existing veterinary office and construct a new 2,773 square foot office with 25 parking spaces in its place.

Republic Bank has been approved by the Board of Commissioners to construct a 3,028 square foot bank building with twenty-two off-street parking spaces, and other associated site improvements at 2400 Darby Road (currently Sharro Gas Station.)

Bryn Mawr Medical Specialists Association has been approved to develop the property located at 986 & 996 E. Railroad Avenue with a three story, approximately 20,439 gross square foot medical office building, with sixty-five parking spaces, and other associated site improvements.

The following properties have received subdivision approval:

1200 Ellston Road- The existing house will remain and a single-family dwelling will be built on the new 6,154 square foot parcel.

1417 Fairview Road- The property has been subdivided into two lots containing 25,500 square feet, and 16,500 square feet, respectively. A new single-family house will be constructed on each lot, and the existing home will be demolished.

217 Walnut Hill Lane- A 14,750 square foot lot has been created for a new single family dwelling. The existing house will remain.

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# **SEWER BACKUP AND FLOODING INSURANCE**



# An Important Announcement from Haverford Township



Sewer backups and flooding can cause devastating property damage and are not covered by standard homeowners' insurance policies. The majority of these claims are the responsibility of the property owner.

Sewage from sanitary sewer lines occasionally back up into houses through drain pipes. These backups not only cause extensive water damage that is difficult and expensive to repair, but also create health hazards.

Haverford Township is not responsible for damages caused by sewers, drains and sump pumps except under limited/special circumstances provided by the PA Municipal Immunity laws.

Township residents must be aware that they should review their homeowner's, flood and sewer backup insurance coverage with their agent/insurance company in order to properly protect their personal residences—probably the most valuable tangible asset that we all have.

Article I, Section 149-3, subsection C (2), Sewer Service Regulations of the Township Code states that all sewer service laterals from the Township's sewer, regardless of location, are the property of the customer and/or owner and shall be maintained by him in good condition and repair.

Please pay particular attention to the following coverages:


# Coverage for Sewers, Drains and Sump Pumps:

This valuable coverage is <u>not</u> included under your standard homeowner's policy but can be purchased by endorsement for an additional premium.

# Flood Coverage:

Flood coverage is <u>not</u> included under your homeowner's policy. However, flood insurance is available under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and can be obtained through your insurance agent or broker.

The Township does not provide flood insurance.

# **Environmental Update**

Haverford Township Department of Parks and Recreation Sustainability Initiative.

Ban the Bottle

Haverford Township Department of Parks and Recreation is launching a Ban the Bottle initiative at our day camps and playgrounds this summer by urging our participants to bring reusable bottles each day.

This will educate our campers on environmental issues and stewardship, while also greatly impacting Haverford's production of waste, beautifying our parks, and strengthening our efforts to recycle more efficiently.

Ban the Bottle will be an easy first step in bringing our community toward Zero Waste. Plastic water bottles consume an enormous amount of energy to produce, package, and transport. We spend over \$11 billion per year on bottled water. Globally, it is estimated that more than 500 billion plastic bottles are produced each year, but only 14 percent are recycled. The rest are landfilled, burned or discarded in our environment. It is a staggering and depressing amount of waste that could have been reduced and re-used.

# The Beginnings of Plastic and Throwaway Living

In August 1955, Life Magazine revealed a cover story entitled "Throwaway Living." Inside this article the term "throw-away society" was coined to describe the new trend of plastic products that promised to minimize the time housewives spent accomplishing their daily chores. Why spend valuable time washing and reusing household objects like plates and silverware when they can be inexpensively made of plastic and disposed of after use?

This launched a plastic revolution that quickly infiltrated every part of our day-to-day lives. In the last fifty plus years we have seen an explosion of products created with a one-use life span. Ironically enough, these single use products are manufactured from plastic, a material made to last thousands of years. It is estimated that today the average American throws away approximately 185 pounds of plastic per year. This accounts for 10 percent of the total waste we generate. Not to mention **75 percent** of this plastic

waste goes directly to landfills, where it will not decompose for 500-1,000 years.

**The Current Recycling Crisis** 

On March 1, 2018, China followed through with its threat to prohibit the import of U.S. plastics, mixed paper and other materials. For years, the US relied on China to take 40 percent of its recyclables for processing and manufacturing. Now, thousands of tons of materials that would have been recycled are going into landfills instead. Some municipalities have stopped collecting items that used to be recycled and others have been stockpiling them to combat this crisis. In Philadelphia, for example, the city can no longer keep up with both the volume and the contaminated condition of recyclable waste. As a result, about 200 tons of recycling material is sent to the huge Covanta incinerator in Chester City each day. The burning of trash releases a host of pollutants, such as nitrogen oxides, sulfur dioxides and particulate matter, which are tiny fragments of debris that, once inhaled, cause an array of health problems.

In addition to landfills, a large portion of plastic waste ends up in our oceans and waterways. The Great Pacific Garbage Patch, also known as the Pacific Trash Vortex, is a collection of marine debris in the North Pacific Ocean that amounts to approximately twice the size of Texas. Further, plastic is often mistaken for food by sea animals and has been found in the stomachs of more than 60% of all seabirds and in 100% of sea turtle species. When an animal ingests plastic, it can cause life-threatening problems, including reduced fitness, nutrient uptake and feeding efficiency.

### **Zero Waste**

At the root of these complex issues is a simple change in habit. We need to reduce waste at the source itself. If we are more conscious about what we buy and use in our day to day lives, we can stop the chain of waste and litter before it even happens. That is why we are urging our community to consider adopting Zero Waste practices. Many communities across the country have already pledged to work toward a Zero Waste Plan or Resolution. Some examples include Oakland CA, NYC, and even Philadelphia.

Zero Waste is about guiding people in changing their lifestyles and practices to match sustainable natural cycles which encourage waste prevention, reusing, recycling and composting the materials we typically dispose. This will promote clean production, prevent pollution, and create

communities in which all products are designed to be cycled safely back into the economy and the environment.

# What are the key benefits?

Climate Impact

Extracting raw materials from natural spaces requires large amounts of energy and causes pollution, whether it is logging a forest, mining for minerals or drilling for oil. Processing these materials requires more energy and causes more pollution and greenhouse gas emissions. Once they're used, the goods are simply dumped in a landfill or destroyed in an incinerator. In contrast, a Zero Waste approach conserves natural resources and reduces pollution from extraction, manufacturing and disposal. Reducing and reusing means fewer products are made, as people buy less and as products are made to last.

# **Save Money**

Zero Waste builds a circular economy where one person's "waste" is a resource for something new. This greatly reduces the cost of having to buy continuous disposable materials for single-use such as like plastic water bottles, paper lunch bags, and plastic utensils.

# **Build Community**

Zero Waste starts at home and finds its way through various sectors of the community. Community projects focused on re-use help redistribute useful goods to those in need, from leftover food donated to shelters, to furniture for refugees, to business clothing for those entering the job market. Community-based zero waste strategies like composting at a community garden, tool sharing and skills sharing to reuse and repair, build capacity to reduce waste and costs.

# Strenathens Health and Wellness

A Zero Waste approach ultimately protects the health of communities by reducing pollution in the air, water and soil by keeping toxics and waste out of landfills and incinerators.

The benefit of being waste conscious and reducing harmful impacts on our environment is beyond calculation. As residents of Haverford Township, it is our responsibility to keep our open spaces clean and beautiful for generations to come. The Parks and Recreation Department's Ban the Bottle Initiative is the first step toward a more sustainable future.

# Report a Sighting

- 1. Check if you're in or out of the quarantine zone by visiting extension.psu.edu/spotted-lanternfly.
- 2. Kill and collect the specimen by freezing it or placing it in rubbing alcohol. If you are able to, take a picture of it.
- 3. Report the sighting online at extension.psu.edu/spottedlanternfly. If you cannot access the internet, call 888-4-BADFLY (888-422-3359) toll-free. Please only use this hotline for sightings outside the quarantine zone.

## **Stop the Spread**

- 1. Destroy all life stages of spotted lanternfly that you find.
- 2. Check your car and outdoor equipment for spotted lanternfly eggs, nymphs, and adults before moving within or out of the quarantine zone. Don't move firewood.
- 3. Share your spotted lanternfly knowledge with others!

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# **Summer Safety Tips**



Your greatest water safety assurance comes from adopting and practicing as many safety steps as possible. Adding an extra safety step around the water can make all the difference.

You can never know which safety step will save a life until it does.

## Stay Close, Be Alert and Watch

- Always watch your children and never leave them unattended
- Keep children away from pool drains, pipes and other openings
- Have a phone close by at all times
- If a child is missing, check the pool first
- Share safety instructions with family, friends and neighbors

# Learn and Practice Water Safety Skills

- Learn to swim; it's fun and good exercise
- Know how to perform CPR on children and adults
- Understand the basics of life saving so that you can assist in a pool emergency

### **Have the Appropriate Equipment**

- Install a fence around the perimeter of the pool and spa of at least four feet in height
- Use self-closing and self-latching gates
- Ensure the pools and spas you use have compliant drain covers
- Install a door alarm from the house to the pool area
- Maintain pool and spa covers in working order
- Have life-saving equipment such as life rings or reaching poles available for use





# Take the BITE Out of Summer - Safely!

We don't have Zika (yet), but now is the time Mosquitoes that cause West Nile Virus can breed in standing water as small as a bottle cap. Eliminating standing water breeding sites at home is the best long-term, environmentally friendly solution. Where standing water can't be eliminated, placing Bti "dunks" (available at hardware stores) in standing water pools is an environmentally friendly way to prevent mosquito growth. Keep grass clippings out of the streets that wash into storm sewers and provide a breeding ground for mosquitoes. Search "West Nile Virus Earth Friendly Tips" for EAC info on how you can *FIGHT THE BITE*!

Check for standing water at these spots at least once a week, especially after rainfall:


Birdbaths · pet water dishes · saucers under flowerpots (empty regularly or fill with sand) · open garbage cans · toys or other materials left outdoors  $\cdot$  sheets of plastic, tarps and Jacuzzi covers · gutters clogged with debris or not graded for proper drainage · old tires (take to tire shop to be recycled or drill drainage holes) · litter (eggs can hatch in a pool as small as a bottle cap!) · holes where trees have been removed (fill with soil or turn into a rain garden) · lawn or landscaping depressions · floating debris in ponds · ornamental pools (stock with fish or aerate) · swimming pools (maintain proper chorine levels year round & make sure filter is operating from May through October)


# To avoid being bitten:


- Wear light colored clothing, and long sleeves & pants when possible.
- Repair tears in window screens to keep mosquitoes from sneaking into your home.
- Stay indoors at sunrise, sunset and early evening when mosquitoes are most active.
- Use yellow "bug" lights outdoors they attract fewer mosquitoes (but they are NOT repellents)
- Carefully use insect repellent effective for mosquitoes with the active ingredients DEET (N,N-diethyl-meta-toluamide), DEET (N,N-diethyl-m-toluamide), Picaridin (KBR 3023), or Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus [active ingredient: p-menthane 3,8-diol (PMD)] following instructions. Where covered, apply to clothing instead of skin.

# **Township Park Upgrades Planned**

In November, the Board of Commissioners approved a Capital Bond, which included \$2.5 million to upgrade the Township parks. This investment in our future is the first stage of a five-year plan, with additional funds to be allocated in 2-3 years. This is the largest allocation for local parks in the Township history and will impact the next 15-20 years. These funds will be used for nicer trashcans, re-paving pathways, new fencing, court resurfacing, regrading ball fields, benches, signs, energy efficient lights and playground equipment.



This is an exciting time to be in Haverford as we develop an update to the Township's Comprehensive Plan. In Pennsylvania, the Comprehensive Plan establishes the

Comprehensive Plan establishes the municipality's vision for future growth and development. It outlines challenges facing the community, identifies potential solutions, and provides guidance to appointed and elected officials on planning-related decisions. The Comprehensive Plan is a living document that grows and changes

with the community.

Earlier this year, the Board of Commissioners appointed Urban Research & Development Corporation as the Haverford Township Comprehensive Plan Consultant. The Board also appointed a Steering Committee to guide the development of the Plan. Input from a broad range of citizens, businesses and other community stakeholders is essential to developing and implementing a Plan that fully reflects the ideas and desires of the community. To achieve this goal, the Steering Committee will use a

comprehensive community engagement strategy designed to maximize community input.

In the coming weeks, URDC and the Steering Committee will embark upon this public outreach effort, which will involve citizen surveys, public meetings, and discussions with members of the community. The Township will announce opportunities for community input via social media and we will dedicate a section of our website where citizens can find current information about this project. In addition, we have established an email address where citizens can send their comments and ask questions about the Comprehensive Plan CompPlan@havtwp.org. In general, the Steering Committee plans to meet on the 4th Monday of each month at 6:30 PM, and these meetings are open to the public.

We look forward to working with the community on this important project. The revised Comprehensive Plan will be the foundation for new zoning and subdivision regulations, and other Plan implementation tools intended to improve the health, safety, and welfare of our community. We hope you will participate in creating a vision for the future of Haverford Township.





The last major borrowing incurred by the Township was in October 2018 when the Township closed on a General Obligation bond issue. This borrowing refinanced old bonds (saving the Township over \$2,000,000 in future interest costs) plus provided new monies of approximately \$5,000,000 for park improvements, storm water projects, two pieces of large equipment, road paving and improvements at the Skatium. Borrowed funds typically represent the funding source for major capital expenses that will serve not only current residents and business owners, but also future stakeholders in years to come. Similar to consumers who must have a good credit score to borrow, so must municipalities. Credit-worthiness is measured largely by a formal credit rating. In 2017, the Township was upgraded to our current bond rating of

a strong AA1 from Moody's Investor Services. This is the second highest rating on Moody's scale and puts us securely in the top 10% of municipalities that Moody's currently rates within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

While a bond rating formally establishes a municipality's credit worthiness, it directly affects the interest rate at which we can borrow. Naturally, a highly rated municipality will have lower interest rates than a municipality whose credit is deemed weak. The swing in interest rates can amount to thousands of dollars in annual debt services and hundreds of thousands of dollars over the course of a bond issue. While our current rating is strong, we'd like to see it enhanced even more the next time we do a large scale borrowing and go through the formal rating process. In today's public finance climate, obtaining a rating 'uptick", is not easy. Just like a household, a municipality must show its stability to pay its debts and live within its means. Other factors that are evaluated during a bond

rating are population trends, stability of the tax base and property values, labor contract obligations, existing debt levels, fund balance reserve levels, strength of management, formalized financial policies, and demonstration of how the municipality has dealt with various economic downturns (e.g. proactively restructuring to reduce costs/enhance revenues or consistently drawing down on reserves instead). We believe the enhancements we've made over the past few years plus additional financial policies that have been put in place will put us in a favorable position during our next evaluation.

The Board of Commissioners and all Township employees will continue to evaluate ways to keep our finances strong not only for bond rating purposes but also so we can continue to provide services to the residents, business owners, and visitors of Haverford Township in the most costeffective and efficient ways possible.

# Greetings from the Haverford Township Police Department!

Since 2018, we've welcomed 8 new police officers and the last 3; Officer Hughes, Uffelman and Jones are finishing their first full year with us. Lt Scott and Sgt Coleman were promoted in February and they are adjusting to their new roles.

The Haverford Township Police Department presented the Officer of the Year for 2019 to Officer Michael Travaline. The award recognizes outstanding individual performance from an officer that exhibits a commitment to their profession and exceptional achievement over the previous year.

Officer Travaline joined the police department in 2011 and is currently assigned to the Investigations Unit. He has been assigned to the patrol division, Delaware County Drug Task

Force, and is also trained as a Hostage Negotiator for the Department. Officer Travaline has received a commendation of Merit, a Unit commendation and a commendation for life saving. Great Job!

We strive to prevent crime throughout the township. A very common crime we see is overnight thefts from unlocked vehicles. We encourage all residents to lock their car doors before heading to bed. A simple click of your key fob may prevent a theft. Also, if you should see something suspicious, please report it by calling 911.

The Police Dept. has responded to 29 Opiate Overdoses in 2019, where Police Officers delivered Narcan. We have helped save 90 victims since we started carrying the life-saving drug Narcan in 2014. Please help us fight the opioid epidemic by properly disposing of unused medicines from

your medicine cabinets. We have a container in the Police Station Lobby where you can do so.

With winter weather approaching, please drive carefully and obey all parking regulations along snow emergency routes during winter storms. In addition, our Snow Removal Ordinance does prohibit shoveling snow or plowing snow from private property onto the roadway.

The Ardmore Avenue bridge is closed until summer 2020. Please follow detour routes as this major bridge is being rebuilt. The Manoa Road bridge is expected to be opening in the fall of 2019.

So far this year, From Jan 1<sup>st</sup> thru August 31<sup>st</sup> 2019, The Police Dept. has made 227 Arrests, issued 177 Non-Traffic Citations, 2,108 Traffic citations, and issued 2,302 warnings.

- 3. Report the sighting online at extension.psu.edu/spotted-lanternfly. If you cannot access the internet, call 888-4-BADFLY (888-422-3359) toll-free. Please only use this hotline for sightings outside the quarantine zone.

#### **Stop the Spread**

- 1. Destroy all life stages of spotted lanternfly that you find.
- 2. Check your car and outdoor equipment for spotted lanternfly eggs, nymphs, and adults before moving within or out of the quarantine zone. Don't move firewood.
- 3. Share your spotted lanternfly knowledge with others!



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## Public Works: Snow Removal

# Haverford Township's Plan for Battling Snow and Ice Storms

#### Spreading Storm


Haverford Township Public Works Department approaches light storms that are expected to produce 0-2 inches of frozen precipitation as a spreading storm. The Public Works Department and PennDOT refer to these storms as spreading storms because the spreading of materials, (brine & rock salt) is the primary tool used to remove ice and snow.

Haverford Township is responsible for the maintenance of 165.07 miles of Township and state roads throughout Haverford Township. Depending upon the forecast, we will pre-treat the roadway surface with salt brine before the winter storm. Throughout the storm, we will spread materials over the length of these roads until all lanes are free of snow and ice. Depending on the temperature, we may plow to remove remaining snow and slush. An average cycle for a Township truck on these roads is one hour.



**Plowing Storm**A storm that is expected to produce more than two inches of precipitation is treated as a plowing event storm. The primary function of the public works crews is plowing the roadways. Do not clear the end of your driveway until the storm has stopped and the road is plowed curb to curb. This will save you work and will lower your frustration level. The Township has a goal to open one

lane of traffic in each direction on every road and later return to plow the snow back to the curb, exposing the storm water inlets. Residents are reminded of Township Ordinance #2629, which clearly states that it is unlawful for any property owner, resident, his/her contractor, agent or employee to shovel, plow discharge or otherwise place snow into any street, roadway, sidewalk, or alley within the Township of Haverford. This ordinance is strictly enforced!



#### Tools

The Township crews will pre-treat roadways with rock salt and salt brine before the storm. Next, we will continue to spread winter materials over the entire length of the roadways throughout the storm until all lanes are free of snow and ice.

Anti-icing, known as brine, is applied to a dry road before snow starts falling. This helps to prevent ice and snow from sticking to the pavement. Utilizing brine allows us to move from a reactive (de-icing) to a proactive approach (anti-icing). Anti-icing accelerates the melting process and promptly returns roads to their normal state. Township employees will be able to cover a larger territory by beginning treatment before the storm begins. We will use less salt as a deicer, resulting in cost savings, and less of an environmental impact on our community. Road salt remains the primary tool for treating winter storms in the Township. The Township maintains a stockpile of salt at our maintenance facility.

#### **Snow Removal Notice**

Residents are reminded to remove their vehicles from the streets as soon as the snow starts to fall. Street parking impedes the Public Works crews, delaying clean up. All sidewalks are to be cleared of snow and ice 24 hours after the snow stops falling. If your neighbor is unable to clear their sidewalk, consider pitching in to clear it out.

# Single Stream Recycling Guidelines

Although many items display the recycling symbol, that does not necessarily mean the local recycling center has the right technology to process them. As a result, many of these so-called recyclables end up contaminating useable materials and may damage recycling equipment. Haverford Township currently takes recyclables to the Republic Services' facility in Upper Merion Township.

#### **ACCEPTABLE ITEMS**

#### **PLASTICS**

All Plastic Containers Labeled #1 - #7 with necks smaller than their bases.



Remove caps/lids, rinse. Labels and neck rings do not need to be removed.

#### **METAL**

- Aluminum beverage cans,
- Steel food and beverage cans
- Aerosol cans (empty)

Remove caps/lids, rinse. Labels do not need to be removed.

#### **GLASS**

Clear, brown, & green glass food and beverage containers.

#### CARDBOARD, PAPERBOARD, PAPER

- Newspapers,
- Inserts and Junk Mail
- Magazines,
- Catalogs,
- Envelopes
- All sizes of cardboard boxes
- Clean Pizza boxes
- Food boxes (ie. crackers, cereal, cake boxes)
- Empty paper towel & toilet paper
- Paperboard packaging (ie. tissue boxes)
- Office and School paper (any color)
- Paper bags (grocery type)
- Phone books & other soft cover books

Be sure all packaging is removed - (ie. styrofoam, bubble wrap, peanuts, plastic liners, plastics, etc.)





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## SEWER BACKUP AND FLOODING INSURANCE



# AN IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT FROM HAVERFORD TOWNSHIP



Sewer backups and flooding can cause devastating property damage and are not covered by standard homeowners' insurance policies.

The majority of these claims are the responsibility of the property owner.

Sewage from sanitary sewer lines occasionally back up into houses through drain pipes. These backups not only cause extensive water damage that is difficult and expensive to repair, but also create health hazards.

Haverford Township is not responsible for damages caused by sewers, drains and sump pumps except under limited/special circumstances provided by the PA Municipal Immunity laws.

Township residents must be aware that they should review their homeowner's, flood and sewer backup insurance coverage with their agent/insurance company in order to properly protect their personal residences—probably the most valuable tangible asset that we all have.

Article I, Section 149-3, subsection C (2), Sewer Service Regulations of the Township Code states that all sewer service laterals from the Township's sewer, regardless of location, are the property of the customer and/or owner and shall be maintained by him in good condition and repair.

Please pay particular attention to the following coverages:

#### **Coverage for Sewers, Drains and Sump Pumps:**

This valuable coverage is <u>not</u> included under your standard homeowner's policy but can be purchased by endorsement for an additional premium.

#### **Flood Coverage:**

Flood coverage is <u>not</u> included under your homeowner's policy. However, flood insurance is available under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and can be obtained through your insurance agent or broker.

The Township does not provide flood insurance.




# The Haverford Township Historical Society Needs New Members







## Capital Park Improvement Update

Work has started on the Capital Parks Improvement Plan that the Board of Commissioners approved last November, beginning with reconfiguring the football field at Veterans Park which was impacted by the construction of the new municipal building.

This 5-year plan is a generational investment in our Township parks.

The tennis courts at Paddock, Coopertown, and Westgate are being resurfaced, and 4 pickle ball courts added at Westgate Park, replacing 2 of the 4 old tennis courts. Pickle ball is a fast growing sport for people of all ages.

New play equipment is scheduled to be installed at Chatham Glen and Llanerch Parks this fall along with new swings at Grasslyn. New fencing was installed at Richland Farms, Westgate, Paddock and Coopertown.

The sidewalks and pathways at Coopertown, Elwell, Normandy, Merwood, Grange, Grasslyn, Bailey, Chatham Glen, Hilltop, Richland Farms, Llanerch, Westgate, Thompson Nature and Paddock are being resurfaced.

New handsome green trashcans will replace the old blue barrels that have been used at the parks for many years and the parking lots at Hilltop Park are being resurfaced.

Planned work for 2020 includes more upgrades at Richland Farms, replacing the backstop and lights at Veterans Field, resurfacing basketball courts throughout the Township and other work TBD.

#### Back to School Safety for Hands and Arms

The start of the new school year brings an increase in many activities that can cause injuries to hands, wrist, arms, elbows and shoulders. Here are some tips for keeping kids safe while they participate in their favorite activities.

Young athletes are at risk for common injuries like fractures, dislocations, ligament injuries, tendon ruptures, and tendonitis. Often these injuries are due to accidents and falls during play, but they can also be caused by overuse. Sports such as tennis, golf, field hockey, ice hockey and lacrosse can cause overuse injuries to hands, elbows and shoulders because of the swinging and shooting motion needed. Baseball pitchers are especially at risk for overuse injuries due to repetitive motion and should follow the recommended pitch counts for their age.





Musicians may risk injury if they overuse their hands by playing their instrument for several hours every day. They are also at risk for neck and shoulder injuries. Nerve compression is quite common due to holding an instrument in the same position for a long period of time. An important strategy for avoiding overuse injuries is for musicians, their instructors and their families to recognize when it's time to take a break from playing.



Young children are at risk for hand and arm injuries on the playground. The National Program for Playground Safety reports that 80 percent of playground injuries are caused by falls. The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission recommends that the area where a child might fall should have a protective surfacing extending at least six feet in all directions and should be at least 12 inches deep. Protective surfacing can be made of wood chips, mulch, sand, pea gravel, shredded tires or rubber mats. Adequate supervision is also important. Climbing bars and "monkey bars" cause more falls and injuries than any other type of playground equipment. Parents can encourage kids to stick to the swings or slide or teach them a few games they can play with friends that don't involve climbing equipment.

#### When to See a Doctor

Most hand, wrist, arm, elbow and shoulder injuries can be treated at home with rest, ice, elevation and over the counter anti-inflammatory medication. However, some injuries need to be evaluated by a hand specialist. Open wounds, fractures, dislocations, jammed fingers, crushed fingertips or fingernail injuries, swelling that doesn't improve within a few days, or loss of motion are signs that a child should be evaluated by a hand surgeon. If your child has sustained an injury and you are unsure of its severity, call us at 1-800-385-7472 to reduce the risk of permanent damage.








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
